A MESSAGE FROM DIRECTOR WOODS



Dear DPS Family,

It's hard to believe we're already halfway through 2024. And with summer in full swing, I want to update you on a few big things that have happened and look ahead to what we have coming up in the second half of 2024.

We kicked off our 100 Deadly Days of Summer travel period over the Memorial Day weekend, and so far

our traffic fatalities are continuing a downward trend. While we can – and should – find celebration in this progress, I ask that you all remain diligent in our mission. Every interaction you have is helping us protect, educate, and save lives, so thank you!

With the Independence Day holiday coming up, we know there will be celebrations that involve alcohol, and that impaired driving does not stop at the shoreline. That is why the agency is again partnering with the SC Department of Natural Resources for increased education and enforcement efforts on our state's highways and waterways leading up to and throughout the Fourth of July holiday period. Along with impaired driving, speed continues to be one of the biggest contributing factors to traffic fatalities in our state. Later this month, we will again join our counterparts in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, and Tennessee for Operation Southern Slow Down. During this multi-state enforcement campaign, our troopers and officers will conduct concentrated enforcement on interstate and state highways to help put the brakes on drivers

traveling at excessive speeds. During last year's campaign, law enforcement in South Carolina issued 6,249 citations for speeding, including more than 3,600 from our troopers. With speed continuing to be a top contributing factor in fatalities on our roads, know that your dedication in this effort has real impact and it is without a doubt saving lives.

Beyond the enforcement efforts and campaigns, this has already been a busy summer at DPS. In the pages of this newsletter, you will find stories about what's next for Colonel Dean Dill, who retired after 30 years of service to the State Transport Police; big upgrades coming to SmartCop to make the jobs of our troopers and officers easier; and a peek at the Highway Patrol's image finalists for this year's Best Looking Cruiser contest. You will also get to know a team of sister troopers following in their late father's footsteps, say hello to the Bureau of Protective Services' newest K-9 officer, and bid a fond farewell to a beloved civilian employee with 50 years of service to our agency.



YOU ASKED — THEY LISTENED

How the latest SmartCop upgrade streamlines fatality packets

The Department of Public Safety's Office of Information Technology (OIT) is rolling out SmartCop upgrades that will integrate the fatality packet into the software, eliminating redundancies and saving troopers precious time in the field.

"I am excited because I know the impact this is going to make," said Lt. Thomas White, Law Enforcement Technology Manager for the Office of Information Technology. "Having been a trooper and a supervisor, I've completed too many of these packets and know how time-consuming it is."

The latest upgrade to SmartCop — more than two years in the making — integrates the paper fatality packet into mobile forms, reducing redundancies in filling out the report and making completion of the packet more user-friendly and specific to the type of collision, according to White. Until now, a trooper had to complete the form by hand on paper, type it into the computer, attach and send it as an email, which would then go through multiple rounds of review.

"But with this upgrade, this information is already collected in the collision report, so you don't have to do it again," White said.

When filling out the form, only the fields that are applicable to the type of collision being investigated will be visible. Additionally, information already included in the collision report will automatically carry over and populate once it's been marked as a fatality. This will save time not just for troopers, but also supervisors and FOIA staff.

"When the FOIA team gets these requests, they can go into SmartCop," White said. "If everything is in there like it's supposed to be, then the FOIA team has everything at their fingertips. They don't have to go back to the trooper to compile it all."

Troopers across all levels of the Highway Patrol are excited for

these changes to roll out. Lieutenant Colonel Travis Manley says the benefits of this upgrade will be multifaceted.

"Quicker and more accurate reporting will improve our overall operational effectiveness," he said. "This new fatality packet will also help troopers by reducing their administrative load, allowing them to manage their time and resources more effectively. But it will also contribute to higher morale and job satisfaction, knowing that tools and processes they use to do their jobs are being looked at and designed to support them in their day-to-day work."

The new fatality packet will go live for Troops 2 and 3 only on July 1, according to White, who also has produced a training video to walk users through the changes. Then, after working out any bugs, it will go live for all troops. So far, the feedback has been positive, he said.

"They are absolutely in love with it, just for the fact that it is streamlined from our current process," White said of the troopers who have tested the new electronic packet. "I needed to make sure it was done right, that it wasn't missing anything, and that it included feedback from not only the command staff, but the guys and girls in the field who are actually using it. That's who it truly affects."

This upgrade has been a priority since White, along with Lt. Jason Cribb, were promoted from the Highway Patrol in 2022 to act as liaisons between sworn law enforcement officers and OIT.

"This team interacts with troopers and officers to address issues from the field and provide the latest technology to deliver solutions," OIT Director Regina Crolley said. "During the next fiscal year, we will continue with numerous technology improvements catering to the officer's needs. This combination of customer focus from experience and technological savviness deliver the best solutions."

STP FATHER-SON DUO REFLECT ON HOW THEIR DADS SHAPED THEIR DESIRE TO SERVE

With three generations of law enforcement officers in their family, serving others is not learned for State Transport Police Master Officer Thomas Thrasher and his son, Officer Peyton Thrasher. It's a family value.

"Our family is a working-class family," said Peyton Thrasher. "There's no doctors or lawyers. My grandpa was in law enforcement. My dad's in law enforcement. My younger brother is in the Army. My mom was a nurse. No one's had a safe job."

Thomas Thrasher's father was a utility lineman and then a sheriff's deputy with the Pickens County Sheriff's Office after serving in the Army during the Vietnam War.

"When he was at the sheriff's office, I remember him coming home late at night to change clothes because his uniform was cut up or covered in blood. The deputy he was riding with would be waiting in the driveway. My dad would come in and say, 'Yeah, I had a bad night.' He would change his clothes, get back in the car, and finish the rest of his shift."



Seeing his dad serving others in uniform inspired Thomas Thrasher to later join the same sheriff's office, but he soon learned that he enjoyed working traffic enforcement more than domestic violence, assault, or robbery calls for service. That led him to the South Carolina Highway Patrol for 19 years, which included 10 years on the Motor Unit as a motorcycle trooper. During his last four

years as a trooper, the work schedule for the Highway Patrol allowed him to work as a long-haul truck driver on his days off. After his retirement in 2016, he began driving full time and logged close to one-million miles in 10 years.

But in 2023, when Thomas Thrasher saw the Department of Public Safety was hiring back retirees, he decided to return to DPS. This time as a State Transport Police officer.

"I thought I would marry the two things that I spent most of my time doing: Working in transportation and working in law enforcement," he said of joining STP. "I'm not young anymore, but I don't consider myself old yet. I'm in that in-between, so I have some good working years left in me."

And he wanted to spend some of those working years with his son. Peyton Thrasher, who joined STP a year earlier in 2022, said his desire to become an officer started at a young age with his dad dropping by his baseball practices on his Highway Patrol motorcycle during his meal break.

"He would always pull up and sit out in the outfield on his motorcycle when we were at practice," the younger Thrasher said. "We all used to think it was the coolest thing."

STP appealed to Peyton Thrasher because of its specialized training, the ability to be proactive in enforcement, and the latitude granted to officers.

"It's just a niche thing in law enforcement," Peyton Thrasher said of STP. "We can do your standard traffic enforcement on non-commercial vehicles, but we're the only ones in the state that can actually enforce the federal regulations for commercial motor vehicles. That really intrigued me."

For Peyton, satisfaction from the job comes from mutual respect that is given and received during his interactions with drivers.

"You might give someone three or four tickets, and at the end of it, they'll say, 'Thank you for treating me with respect. I'm doing my job, and I realize you're doing your job,'" he said. "That's one of the things I find rewarding. When there is mutual respect."

For Thomas Thrasher, taking a dangerous truck or a fatigued driver off the road gives him the same satisfaction as taking an impaired driver off the road as a trooper.

"I knew that there was something there — I made an impact immediately," he said. "The road was different."

Thomas Thrasher isn't surprised Peyton followed in his footsteps. But he is humbled.



"He got to see a lot of the not-so-good stuff, like having to work holidays or nights," he said. "But he decided to go with it anyway. It does make me think that, at some point, maybe I did do some things right, and he wanted to follow that."

Peyton Thrasher says despite the challenges of the job, his father was a great role model for how to handle those and balance them with his responsibility to his family.

"I never remember him calling in sick or coming home disgruntled," he said. "I'm sure he was at some point, but I never saw it. He worked 40-plus hours a week. He worked weekends. But he showed up to work and provided for his family."

Despite the father and son duo working full time in the same Upstate region, sometimes they may not see each other for days at a time. They do, however, get to hear each other's voice on the radio every day.

"Occasionally we work together. I can see how he handles himself," Thomas Thrasher said. "I can't tell him he does a good job," he says with a smirk. "I probably should tell him more often that I'm proud of him, because I am."

Thomas Thrasher recalls about the time he worked with his dad for a few years and the irreplaceable memories he has because of that experience.

"I will always be grateful for that," he said. "I was hoping when I came back (to DPS) that it would be something similar with Peyton and me. I got to work with my dad. Peyton's getting to work with his dad. It's full circle."

SCDPS NAMES NEW STATE TRANSPORT POLICE COMMANDER, ANNOUNCES PROMOTIONS IN COMMAND STAFF

The SC Department of Public Safety Director, Robert G. Woods, IV has named a new South Carolina State Transport Police commander, in conjunction with two command staff promotions.

Dwayne D. Wilson, a 29-year veteran of the State Transport Police, was chosen to succeed Colonel Dean M. Dill, who will retire with nearly 30 years of service to the state at the end of June. Wilson began his career with the State Transport Police in 1994.

"I am proud to be a part of this agency and I am both humbled and grateful to accept this new responsibility," said Wilson. "I have worked closely alongside Colonel Dill for a number of years and I will miss his leadership and direction. However, I have a great command staff, and together, I am confident that we will continue to push STP forward and carry on the positive legacy that Colonel Dill has modeled."

Dill, who has served as Commander of STP since 2020, announced his retirement will be effective July 1, 2024. Colonel Dill has been with STP since 1994 and has served in both enforcement and administrative capacities during his tenure. Dill was the first State Transport Police Commander to work his way up through the ranks, from officer to Colonel.

Two additional command structure promotions were announced on June 3. Lee T. Catoe was promoted to the rank of Major and named as the next STP Executive Officer to replace Wilson. Major Catoe began with STP in 2007, most recently serving as Captain over the Lower State Regions 1, 5, 6, and the Community Education and Outreach unit since 2020. Catoe is an 8-year veteran of the United States Army where he achieved the rank of sergeant.

Charles T. Norton, Jr, a Darlington native, was named Captain of the STP lower state region to replace Catoe. Captain Norton began with STP in 2010, most recently serving as a Lieutenant at STP Headquarters since 2021. A 31-year veteran of law enforcement, he previously served with the Florence Police Department and Darlington Sheriff's Office.

RETIRING STP COLONEL LOOKS BACK ON 30 YEARS AND TO WHAT LIES AHEAD

As Colonel Dean Dill says goodbye to law enforcement when he retires from the SC State Transport Police at the end of June, he knows it's the beginning of an exciting new chapter — for him, the new colonel, Dwayne Wilson, and for STP.

"I love the job, and think I've made some good progress in my time here," said Dill, who leaves after 30 years of service, including nearly four as STP's colonel. *"But it's time to relinquish that to somebody else, let the new ideas come in and help us keep growing and moving forward."*

The first STP commander to ascend the ranks from officer to colonel, Dill recalled applying to several law enforcement agencies as an eager 21-year-old fresh out of the academy.

"And then I heard about a new division at the Department of Public Safety — the State Transport Police," he said. *"I thought it would be interesting. After about six months, I was hooked. But, we really didn't have a good identity when STP was first created in the early 1990s,"* he explained. *"I don't know how many times I got asked in a restaurant, 'Do y'all transport prisoners?'"*

Dill credits his predecessor, Colonel Leroy Taylor, for establishing and reinforcing STP's identity. After becoming Colonel in 2020, Dill continued to refine that identity and the public's knowledge of STP, improving not just how his division was viewed from the outside, but also how it was viewed from within.

"I wanted to make sure this is a place these men and women are proud to work, and that they like working here," he said. *"I believe in treating everybody with respect."*

While much has changed at STP over the past 30 years, a few things have not: Like the handcuffs and sidearm Dill carried on his belt from the road to the colonel's office. *"Sometimes turning your stuff in makes it real to you,"* he said. *"I've had some of this gear as long as I've been here."*

While the decision to leave was difficult, Dill knows it was the right one. *"To me, it was just time,"* he said. *"I've always heard, 'When you know, you know.'*

Although he may be leaving his life as STP commander, he still will be involved in maintaining safety on South Carolina roadways, working in a safety and compliance division for a motor carrier company.

"I'll be coaching commercial drivers to operate vehicles more safely, staying in compliance with regulations, and keeping us out of harm's way," he said. *"The strong background I have in federal regulations will be a huge asset."*

With a much shorter commute in his future, Dill shares he's looking forward to spending more time with his wife and children.

"We were actually married while I was at the academy," he chuckled. *"We got married on a Saturday, and I came back to the academy on a Sunday night. It was not ideal, but it helps to keep up with my work and wedding anniversary since they're pretty close."*

As a father, Dill is used to giving advice, and this extends to new STP officers.

"Apply yourself and do the best you can do out there. If you're the best you can be, you're going to make us, as an agency, the best we can be. Because exceptional agencies are defined by exceptional employees at all levels."

As this momentous chapter comes to a close, Dill says he will continue to proudly support and cheer from afar, *"I'll always be a fan of them and support them,"* he said. *"I just want to see them continue to grow and improve. At the end of the day, that's all I hope for."*

Deputy Catoe joined the ranks of the Richland County Sheriff's Department. Congratulations, Deputy Catoe!



Fifteen female troopers and officers with the Department of Public Safety completed the agency's first Female Officer Survival School, hosted by Fortis Tactical Systems.



'CONNECTING THE DOTS'

How the BPS Intel Unit prevents potential threats to SC State House before they happen

Having information about a person with malicious intentions is useless if that information is not shared. Enter Senior Officer Kevin Hogan of the SC Bureau of Protective Services, whose new job is to make sure the South Carolina State House, Governor's Mansion, South Carolina Supreme Court, its employees, and its visitors remain safe by identifying potential threats ahead of time.

"The ability to collaborate and decipher intelligence — collect the dots and then connect the dots — to avoid a critical incident or eliminate a possible terroristic threat is extremely important," said Hogan, who is now an Intel Analyst for BPS' Intelligence Unit. "It's all about mitigating or lowering the risk factor to the general public visiting the State House Complex and our elected officials."

Housing both chambers of the General Assembly, as well as 27 state agencies, the State House Complex is already the nerve center of South Carolina's government. But with its historic capitol building, manicured landscaping, and location in the heart of the state's capital, the complex is also the stage for a variety of protests, marches, rallies, and demonstrations across the political spectrum. Hogan's job as the first full-time intel analyst for BPS is to learn, identify and evaluate any potential threats, and share that information with his team and local and state law enforcement partners.

"The key is to understand the context of what is being said and balancing that with an individual's rights and free speech," he said. "The ultimate goal, regardless of the event's topic, is to provide a safe and secure environment for the participants and the general public to voice their thoughts and beliefs, while protecting their First Amendment right and staying within the confines of the law."

After an event is identified, Hogan gets to work conducting a risk assessment to identify safety concerns, threats, and potential counter views so his leadership can determine appropriate staffing levels.

"A full-time Intel analyst is an invaluable asset to our daily law enforcement operation at the Bureau of Protective Services," BPS Chief of Police Matthew Calhoun said. "Hogan's expertise in

gathering, analyzing, and interpreting intelligence helps us stay one step ahead, ensuring the safety and security of our communities. With his dedication and insights, we can make informed decisions, anticipate threats, and protect our state with utmost vigilance."

For Hogan, it's about keeping people safe, but also not letting history repeat itself. He enlisted in the Navy after the September 11 terror attacks, serving 21 years. That same sense of service drove him into law enforcement.

"We all know the significant effect that 9/11 had on us as a nation, as a state, and as individuals," he said. "The intelligence cycle was broken. The dots in that case were being collected, but never connected."

The June 2015 massacre at a historically Black church in Charleston — and the ensuing Confederate flag debate — ignited a torrent of heated demonstrations on the State House grounds, including a violent clash between the Ku Klux Klan and the New Black Panther Party. It also laid the foundation for BPS' Intel Unit.

"We had information and intelligence happening, but it was not being shared in the proper context," Hogan said. "This was a lesson in creating an intelligence cycle to assist with better preparation, and promoting positive partnerships to minimize potential threats."

Connecting the dots is what Hogan tries to accomplish with the Intel Unit. By leveraging partnerships with other agencies — from the Columbia Police Department, to the State Law Enforcement Division, and even the FBI or Secret Service — the BPS Intel Unit ensures everyone is privy to the same information.

"With the growing and evolving mission of our division, being able to partner with SLED's Fusion Center, Columbia Police, USC Police, and other law enforcement agencies to help minimize threat potential to the State House Complex is pretty exciting," Hogan said. "Investigations drive the intelligence, and the intelligence directs the investigations."

For Hogan, he hopes this is just the beginning for the unit he is proud to serve.




HOW A COLOR TELEVISION IN 1969 LED OHSJP'S SUSAN BERRY TO A 55-YEAR CAREER AT SCDPS

DPS JOINS MADD SC AND SCDPPPS TO ANNOUNCE NEW DUI LAW

Director Robert Woods (SCDPS) joined Regional Executive Director Steven Burritt (MADD South Carolina) and Acting Director Jodi Gallman (South Carolina Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services) at a press conference on May 17, to speak in support of the new "All Offender Law" that went into effect May 19.

The "All Offender Law" now requires all drivers convicted of driving under the influence (DUI) - regardless of their Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) - to participate in the Ignition Interlock Device

(I.I.D.) program. Previously, participation was optional for DUI first offenses with a BAC below .15.

The new legislation was signed into law by Governor Henry McMaster in July of 2023 in an effort by South Carolina lawmakers to reduce the number of DUI incidents and save the lives of residents and visitors to the state.
