# STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY HIGHWAY SAFETY GRANT APPLICATION

The South Carolina Department of Public Safety, Office of Highway Safety and Justice Programs (OHSJP) administers the federally-funded State and Community Highway Safety Program (commonly referred to as Section 402), and coordinates highway safety activities throughout the state. Each year, South Carolina receives approximately three million dollars in Section 402 funding. SC uses these and other federal monies to fund sustainable grant proposals aimed at reducing collisions and traffic-related fatalities and injuries. Applicant's proposals must demonstrate a measurable impact on highway and traffic safety; be cost effective; and contain a method of evaluation that substantiates both performance and impact. Highway Safety grant funds are awarded to qualified applicants to create new or expand existing highway safety programs, with the intention that such initiatives continue when grant funding is discontinued. State agencies; non-profit 501(c) 3 organizations, political subdivisions (city and state), and state, local and federally-recognized Indian tribal governments are eligible to apply. The usual grant funding cycle is from October 1 - September 30. The submission deadline is in February of each year.

Traffic collisions represent a significant issue on South Carolina's roadways and DUI and Speeding (Driving Too Fast for Conditions) consistently rank among the top five contributing factors for fatal and injury collisions. Despite the state's size and lower population (compared to that of the nation South Carolina's mileage death rate (MDR), or the number of fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles traveled, is consistently significantly higher than that of the nation. In 2021, the national MDR was 1.37 compared to South Carolina's MDR of 2.08. The state's alcohol-impaired driving fatality rate is also consistently higher than that of the nation; South Carolina's 2021 alcohol-impaired driving MDR was 0.70 compared to 0.43 for the nation. It is clear that large -scale efforts are needed to address the behaviors of speeding and driving under the influence that continue to contribute to the state's high fatality rates.

Traffic enforcement plays a crucial role in deterring impaired driving, encouraging compliance with speed laws, and reducing other unsafe driving behaviors. Thus, enhanced law enforcement presence and enforcement activity is needed throughout the state, particularly during periods of time in which marked increases in collisions and fatalities occur: Christmas/New Year's, Memorial Day Weekend, Labor Day and during the summer. Providing resources to enhance law enforcement agencies' capabilities to increase enforcement efforts are essential, thus, our agency seeks funding support for activity hours to conduct proactive traffic enforcement efforts (checkpoints, saturation/directed patrols) during the Law Enforcement Challenge period, to include specialized enforcement activities during the four major mobilization periods: Christmas/New Year's Sober or Slammer!, Buckle Up, South Carolina, Operation Southern Slow Down, and Labor Day Sober or Slammer!

Our agency will complete and submit a signed Law Enforcement Challenge Participation statement, which will be submitted along with the award acceptance documents, and the agency will serve as an active member of its local LEN. The officers assigned to the grant will actively participate in special traffic enforcement efforts, to include participating in the implementation of traffic safety checkpoints and saturation efforts, working with other LEN members, and concentrating enforcement activities where collisions and/or specific types of violations are occurring.

Officers assigned to the project will conduct specialized enforcement activity in support of the Law Enforcement Challenge of the SC Department of Public Safety based on the schedule outlined by the Office of Highway Safety and Justice Programs. This will include additional enforcement activity during two DUI mobilization crackdowns, Sober or Slammer!, during the Christmas/New Year's holidays of 2024-2025 and during the days leading up to and including the Labor Day holiday of 2025. The officer(s) will also fully participate in enforcement activities associated with the state's occupant protection enforcement crackdown, Buckle Up, South Carolina, leading up to and including Memorial Day 2025, and Operation Southern Slow Down during the summer of 2025. Additional enforcement activities may also be observed throughout the campaign period. These additional activities may include joint enforcement efforts at the conclusion of LEN meetings or other proactive enforcement efforts scheduled as a result of citizens' complaints, jurisdiction-specific events/activities (festivals, sporting events, etc.) or in-response to increases in collisions/fatalities throughout the grant period.
